## Reporting Crime in Hawkwood

The Calgary Police Service (CPS) and HCA encourage all residents to report all incidents of crime that they experience or see in Hawkwood. As evidenced recently in the news, the CPS is willing to re-allocate officers and resources to areas of the city that need it. The CPS uses statistics to do this and if they don't know about a crime, they will assume that there isn't a need for more resources. What if both you and your neighbour had items stolen from your vehicle (#1 crime in Hawkwood), he reported it and you didn't, and his property was recovered and returned to him, but yours went unclaimed because you didn't report it? ## Hawkwood Soccer

# Hawkwood Traffic Safety

Recent Calgary Police Service (CPS) monitoring in Hawkwood confirmed speeding remains a concern in some areas. Sites with prior issues were monitored for 3 days in Feb: Hawkstone field playground zones, and Hawkwood Boulevard near John Laurie. The great news is that 95% of residents adhered to the posted limit. Of concern is some drivers were traveling fast enough to be issued tickets every 20 minutes on Hawkwood Boulevard, and 45 minutes in the Hawkstone field playground zone.

Frequent speeding is dangerous both to pedestrians and local drivers that are trying to pull into traffic. Vehicle stopping distance increases 20% for every 10% increase in speed. And at higher speeds, pedestrians and vehicles are encountered more quickly, leaving less time to react. Thus a vehicle traveling 30 km/hr can stop in 12 m, but needs 37 metres at 60 km/hr. Pedestrians struck by a car at 60km/hr, have only a 10% chance of survival. Survival increases to 55% at 50km/hr and 95% at 30km/hr. On average, one Calgarian is struck every day, and 10 die each year. This is why the City “Step Forward” initiative is reviewing options like 40km/hr residential speed limits.

A resident recently raised a related concern on Hawkwood Boulevard by St. Thomas church. On two occasions, his family had to stop proceeding through the crosswalk to avoid being struck by cars that failed to yield. One driver was focused on his cellphone, and the other was in a hurry. Unfortunately, this crosswalk does not meet city criteria for pedestrian lights, but may be eligible for other improvements. To help assess this, please email [transportation@Hawkwood.ca](mailto:transportation@Hawkwood.ca) if you have had similar incidents at this site.

Pedestrians can help keep themselves safe. This includes checking for traffic, getting eye contact with the driver, and insuring the vehicle is stopping before entering the crosswalk. Having the right-of-way will not keep you safe - 53% of Calgarians struck by vehicles were in this situation. At night, wear reflective clothing to make yourself easily visible.

CPS will be asked to continue enforcement in Hawkwood through 2016. Unfortunately, the risk of tickets, demerits and higher insurance is necessary to improve road safety. Resident feedback helps insure CPS focuses in the right areas. Traffic enforcement

## Bicycle Helmet Safety

Head injuries are a leading cause of serious injury and death to children riding bicycles\*. Most injuries occur when a cyclist suffers a fall, strikes a stationary object, or collides with another cyclist/pedestrian. Remember – it’s the law in Alberta that cyclists under the age of 18 must wear a helmet (and highly recommended for all ages). Helmets should be CSA approved and worn during recreational activities such as skateboarding, in-line skating, or cycling.

### Getting informed

- Wearing a helmet while cycling can prevent a serious injury, or even save a life;
- Brain injuries can cause permanent disability or death;
- Reduce your risk by always wearing your helmet;
- Replace any helmet that has been involved in a crash, even if it appears undamaged.

### Getting started

- Allow children to assist when buying their helmet. Cyclists who choose their own helmet are more likely to wear them;
- Start the habit early. Young children learning to ride tricycles need to wear helmets;
- Parents must lead by example – always wear a helmet when cycling.

### Getting the right fit

- Take the time to properly fit and adjust your helmet to ensure maximum protection in case of a crash;
- When worn properly, helmets should fit level, not tilted up, or down over the forehead;
- Helmets should feel snug, but not too tight. To test the fit, the helmet should not fall off when you shake your head from side-to-side while the straps are unfastened;
- Adjust the chin straps to form a “Y” below and slightly forward from the ears;
- Only one finger should be able to fit under the chin strap when it is fastened;
- Do not forget to use the sizing pads included with the helmet. They will help improve the overall fit, comfort and safety.

# The Importance of Reporting Crime

Did you know that a substantial amount of crime isn't reported to police? There are many reasons that people choose not to report a criminal offence. They may feel that it is too minor in nature or that nothing can or will be done. They may feel that it's not worth the time or effort or that police have more important things to do.

The Calgary Police Service pays close attention to reported crime statistics within communities and across areas of the city. In fact, statistical analysis can be a driving force behind how our Service chooses where and how to deploy resources.

Analysis of reported crime allows police to identify 'hot spots' of activity and also helps to measure and pinpoint emerging crime trends. A lack of accurate data makes identification of these locations difficult and unreliable.

So-called 'minor' crimes such as car-prowling (theft from vehicles), vandalism and other property related crime can be an indicator of a larger problem in a community. An increase in these types of crimes can indicate that an offender has moved into an area that additional police resources are needed, or that something else has changed within the community. Becoming aware of each of these factors is important for police to move forward in addressing community concerns.

### How to report a non-emergency crime

The emergence of technology has made crime reporting much easier and faster, and allows police to obtain an up-to-date glimpse of what is going on in the community.

- By phone – 403-266-1234 (Police non-emergency line)
- Walk-in to your local District office (Market Mall is the nearest community station)

If there is an ongoing situation within your community, you also have the option of contacting your area Community Resource Officer (CRO) through your local District office to make them aware.

### How else can you help?

- Encourage your family, friends and neighbours to report crime or suspicious activity within your

community.

- Be aware of your surroundings. If something or someone seems out of place, there is likely a good reason for this. Report any suspicious behaviour to the police.
- Lock it up! Don't provide offenders with any opportunity – secure your vehicle, garage and home (including closing windows when you are away and at night).

## Councillor Report

This spring, Transportation Network Companies (TNCs) like Uber will be able to legally operate in The City of Calgary. Like most Calgarians, I believe in free enterprise, which is why I supported the creation of a new bylaw to provide more choice and competition amongst TNCs. The new bylaw will allow TNCs to operate in a fair and competitive market. They address citizen, driver and passenger safety and ensure greater competition and customer service. The bylaw proposes common sense requirements for TNCs' including:

- An annual operating licence from The City of Calgary;
- Valid Class 4 driver's licence;
- Annual Calgary Police Service (CPS) background check;
- Proof of valid commercial insurance as required by the Government of Alberta;
- Proof of eligibility to work in Canada;
- Proof of provincially-approved 134-point mechanical inspection, conducted annually or every 50,000 km whatever comes first.

While it is important that we have more choice and competition amongst TNCs, it is also important that the new bylaw provides adequate safety and security for both drivers and passengers of TNCs. I believe that this new bylaw will achieve this balance and provide all Calgarians with more choice, and allow TNC's to operate in a fair and competitive market.

Pedestrian safety is another important issue that we have been taking action on. This spring, new crosswalks have been installed and current crosswalks have been enhanced at numerous locations in Ward 2. This includes an enhanced crosswalk at Rocky Ridge Road & Royal Oak Way, a new pedestrian corridor on Crowfoot Way in Crowfoot Centre, and more will be coming throughout this spring and summer.

Over 100 people attended the open house on the Sarcee Trail Interchange at Stoney Trail to provide their feedback on the proposed improvements. These improvements will make the interchange safer and also help reduce travel times for the movement of goods and for commuters traveling southbound on Sarcee Trail to eastbound Stoney Trail. Construction is anticipated to begin in early May. Please check out my website at [www.joemagliocca.com](http://www.joemagliocca.com) for updates on this project.

Secondly, Parks Foundation Calgary has agreed to take on the garden project. For those that don't know, Parks Foundation is a project administrative company that works to help non profit groups to achieve success with planned projects. This will enable us to provide tax receipts for any donations above \$25. They will also assist us with all of our accounting and money management. ## Spring Sowing

Many avid gardeners are already thinking about gardening in March ( or earlier) and are waiting for spring to get out gardening. The unusual warm weather we have been having really gets the gardening 'juices' flowing!

We don't have garden beds yet at the Hawkwood Community Garden, but we can still start a small garden in our back yards, in pots on our patios and balconies. By April, dedicated gardeners have a zillion ideas about what to plant. They may have searched for seeds at the gardening places, pored over the garden catalogues or attended some gardening workshops.

If you haven't attended any of the excellent workshops offered through the Calgary Horticultural Society, you may want to check out one or two coming up in April: "Design Solutions: Gardens of Inspiration: Pollinator Gardens, April 2 and "Five Composting Habits to Cultivate: on April 5th. Also, Calgary Horticultural

Society's big Garden Show is on at Spruce Meadows on April 9 and 10th. Some topics of interest are "Fun Edible Gardens for Kids", "Green Roof Birdhouses", "Herb Window Box Container Gardens" as well as many booths for garden enthusiasts. Another activity of garden enthusiasts is to start seeds indoors. Perhaps you have some old seeds and don't know if they are viable. Here's an idea for germinating those seeds before putting into pots indoors.

1. Dampen a coffee filter.
2. Put a few seeds inside the filter.
3. Place filter inside a ziplock bag.
4. Blow air into the bag with a straw
5. Seal the bag and put on your counter in a warm place.
6. \*Check the bag periodically to see if it is moist enough and use a spritzer to spray water inside the bag.

Once the seeds germinate, you can put into a little pot with soil and watch them grow! Happy gardening....

## Did You Know...

...that an invasive plant species has been found in Hawkwood? In 2011, a weed commonly called Dame's Rocket (*Hesperis matronalis*) was found on the south-facing slopes of Hawkcliff Park and over 400 plants were hand pulled. Dame's Rocket is considered a noxious weed under the Alberta Weed Control Act and is a species that needs to be controlled so that it doesn't spread and choke out the natural vegetation. This weed is similar to other ornamental species such as Garden Phlox (5 petals), but it has only 4 petals that are usually pink, lavender or purple-coloured. It is an early spring biennial that can be 1 m (3 feet) tall and can form dense infestations. If you're walking your dog in Hawkcliff Park (or any other greenspace, for that matter) and you think you have seen Dame's Rocket, call 3-1-1 and report it. Oh, and don't confuse this weed with the beautiful, close-to-the-ground Prairie Crocus which is also an early spring flowering wild plant that has pale purple, hairy stemmed flowers.



# Proposed Scenic Park Benches in Hawkwood

Consultation work is nearly complete on the proposal to relocate existing park benches in Hawkwood to scenic locations in our community. Even though Hawkwood has over 30 benches, almost none of our spectacular public spaces have a bench where residents can sit and enjoy the view.

Support for the relocation of benches to scenic areas was identified by the following long-term processes:

1. Extensive consultation on what Hawkwood residents would like to see in our community was conducted in spring 2014. This included formal surveys (245 responses) and an online crowdsourcing survey, where residents could submit and vote on ideas (76 participants, 5325 votes cast). The installation of park benches was one of the more frequent written responses in the formal surveys. Park benches overlooking Hawkwood schools was ranked 4th out of 71 crowdsourcing ideas submitted.
2. Nine scenic locations were identified for potential bench placement. 38 residents were surveyed at the 2014 AGM and Leaf renewal meetings, to identify the top 6 preferred locations. These surveys provided opportunity to express concerns. None were recorded.
3. A final proposed site was selected for each bench and screened with the city. Per the city process, volunteers conducted site line surveys of residents closest to the 6 proposed locations. This showed that between 73 - 95% were accepting of the proposal to relocate a park bench to the proposed site. The few objections to the proposed bench typically mentioned the potential for noise and nuisance activity.

Stakeholder concerns were considered when selecting proposed bench locations. All benches have been moved as far as possible from residents, while trying to preserve the scenic benefits of the location. Several were adjusted from the optimum scenic location to take advantage of natural sound barriers. Further adjustments were made after stakeholder consultation. The Calgary Police Services Resource Officer was contacted re potential impacts from benches, and indicated the vast majority do not create a significant problem. Existing benches in Hawkwood are not known to cause issues, and will be the source of benches relocated to these sites.

In conclusion, community feedback shows a high level of support for scenic benches in Hawkwood public spaces.

Any asset placed in public community spaces has potential to impact local stakeholders. However the impact of these benches is expected to be minimal, and consistent with living adjacent to a public space. Also, efforts have been made to mitigate these impacts. The balance of these considerations indicate scenic benches will have an overall positive benefit to Hawkwood residents, and is an appropriate project for the community.
